




Sectie-C offers around 100 designers opening up their studios, ateliers and workshops for visitors to explore.

Highlights of the area consisted of manipulating metals, gradient stained wood and patterned glass. Tim Teven's *Tube Series* collection features unused zinc plated steel tubes going through the process of pressing and bending to achieve a ready-made aesthetic. The work shows an interplay between mechanical and hand-made gestures.

The use of two polar opposite materials to create one product allows artists to create pieces that play with shadow and light, showcasing the juxtaposition between heaviness and delicacy.

*Praskl*o describes the story behind their collection as the glass representing our Earth and the concrete encasing the glass supports the uneasy feeling of the planet moving around in the vast space. The stone gives us the grounded energy. These works challenge our perception of materials traditionally viewed as mundane, transforming them into something emotive and transcendent.



3D printing is still as prevalent as ever. It gives designers the freedom to reach applications across multiple fields whilst benefitting in cost, customisation and reduced waste.

Ioana Maria Caramiciu takes this one step further and explores 4D printed textiles. She transforms everyday materials into meaningful tools for mental well-being through tactile engagement. With everyday anxieties and stress building up into our lives, these are designed to provide relief that change shape when handled, encouraging fidgeting behaviours.

At Envisage, we have been experimenting with our in-house 3D Printer to create PLA patterns applied on materials.



Our CMF Intern researched colour and materials for the theme 'A Trip Abroad', as part of her project focusing on the future of aviation. The materiality carefully selected, was designed to enhance the passenger experience by immersing them in the feel of their holiday destinations. In this instance, the inspiration was taken from a rustic street door, that led to creating the pattern for the material.





Although hand-anodising metal is not new, it is the different process to achieve this outcome that stood out at the 'Say Something Nice' exhibition in Sectie-C.


Paul Coenen has been experimenting with a technique where shrink-wrapped aluminum forms textured patterns as dyes follow the creases. For example, the Section Coffee Table piece is made with two layers of colour; a vibrant yellow followed with a deep purple-blue on top, whilst giving glimpses of raw aluminum beneath. Each section then gets anodised individually before being assembled into its final piece.

The muted tutti-frutti color palette is an intriguing trend at Dutch Design Week, adding a fresh twist to traditional vibrant colors associated with "tutti frutti." Designers incorporated muted tutti-frutti shades into seating arrangements, tables, and statement installations, using color as a subtle way to draw attention without overwhelming the space.





This colour palette analysis extracted from imagery across exhibitions at the festival adds a fall harvest vibe; very fitting for the current season. The orange, green and yellow represent fruit and vegetables picked from a recent harvest or the changing colour of the leaves about to drop from the trees. These colours are vibrant but not over-stimulating.







Bright and bold colours can be over-whelming for some but throughout the festival, a selection of these colours were displayed just right providing a stimulating and attractive environment portrayed throughout different mediums. The technique of colour blocking combines large, solid and contrasting colours within a single design or composition.

Raw Color is one good example. They have developed a set of objects that represent a different aspect of colour such as density, proportion, shade and blending. They have collaborated with IKEA to bring out the sold out *Tessamans* collection of everyday items that bring joy and character to their homes.

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
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



This moodboard is our representation of the Raw Color x IKEA collection using various materials from our Material Library. Featured are DANI's Vernise Souple leather collection with a high gloss finish, considered for it's durability and wipe-clean. The colour palette and materials are mostly primary colours, giving the feel of a nostalgic child's past-time.





Purple is not just a trend colour but is also associated with notions of luxury and mystery, it has a unique power to convey both intensity and calm. Purple has been widely used in tech branding, in particular, electric purple carries a futuristic vibe and is often linked to artificial intelligence, gaming and digital arts.

Pauline van Dongen has developed solar energy weaved into lightweight textiles. The use is for canopies, facades and tents. This innovative material offers designers the opportunity to use it for generating solar energy and to also cool down urban areas. The facade offers an opportunity for buildings that lack the load bearing capacity needed for solar panels. Another step in the action for climate change.



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







Purple Power

Shades of purple can convey intensity with elegance. Dark shades like deep plum can create a feeling of an intimate and moody atmosphere whilst lilac can bring a calm and uplifting energy. Studio Mo Man Tai presented "Pillarisation vs. Human Rights". By playing with volume, layers and contrasts, it re-imagines future campaigns for human rights, believing it to be much more impactful for change.







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
Statement stitching in different mediums to hold material panels together were shown across fashion, furniture and products. The idea being that you can replace each panel due to damage, or submit for servicing without replacing a whole product that would negatively impact the planet and avoid unneccessary costs.

Balena x Variable Seams enabled BioCir® material, an end-of-life solution including full decomposition and biodegradation. It is an alternative to harmful plastics like Polyester and Nylon. You can assemble or remove panels by hand and replace as needed.

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
Different interpretations of contrast forms presented were deliberately squished, imprinted or shape shifted. This pushes the boundaries of traditional design. These methods played with expectations, exploring and encouraging the visitor to engage with the objects.

Treating materials in an unconventional way allows us to expect surprises and re-think the process of making. It can still be a functional object despite the appearance and allows us to truly appreciate the beauty of the new form.

Tim Teven's Stainless Steel Vases are sourced from the scrapyard, forced into shape with 45-65 metric tons then sanded and cleaned to give a fresh finish. Leo Koda's Wall Clocks are submerged in boiling water and this expands the air in the 3D Printed structure, causing them to puff out.
